Now, his name is being floated in Washington as a likely candidate for a Cabinet post, replacing Commerce Secretary Robert A. Mosbacher, who is expected to resign shortly to run President Bush's reelection campaign.

And it all started with a phone call. Never having followed, much less participated in politics, Cedillos phoned Gov. Pete Wilson's Senate campaign headquarters in 1988 and offered to fundraise for him. Wilson's campaign staff had little expectations for what this political unknown could produce, but

And Cedillos delivered. In a big way. "One thing about Ron is that when he gets involved, he delivers," says Greg Haskin, executive director of the Orange County Republican Party. "Many people in politics talk 1,000 percent and deliver only 40 percent. But Cedillos delivers all of what he says he will."

accepted his help.

Though exact figures are not available, insiders put Cedillos fundraising totals somewhere in the "hundreds of thousands." His rewards have been in terms of increased political clout. Cedillos enjoys close relationships with Gov. Wilson and Vice President Dan Quayle, and the respect of OC Republicans.

Appointed to the California State University Board of Trustees by Gov. Wilson last August, Cedillos says he now spends 90 percent of his time as an advocate for philanthropic causes and public policy

'My primary interest is to help enact legislation that will improve the business climate in California," he says. To that end, he serves as a consultant for writing such legislation and works behind the scenes and within the aerospace industry to garner support for the programs and politicians he favors.
